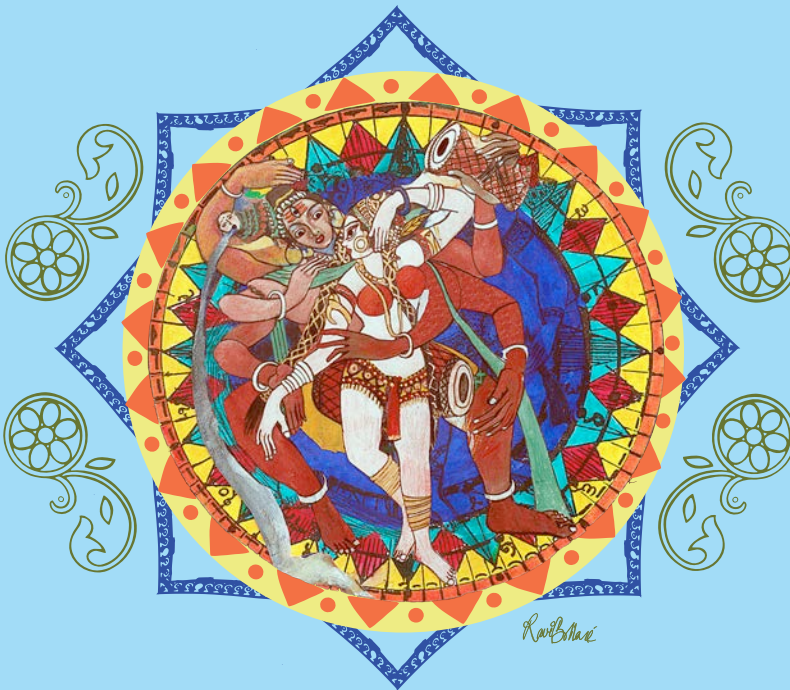


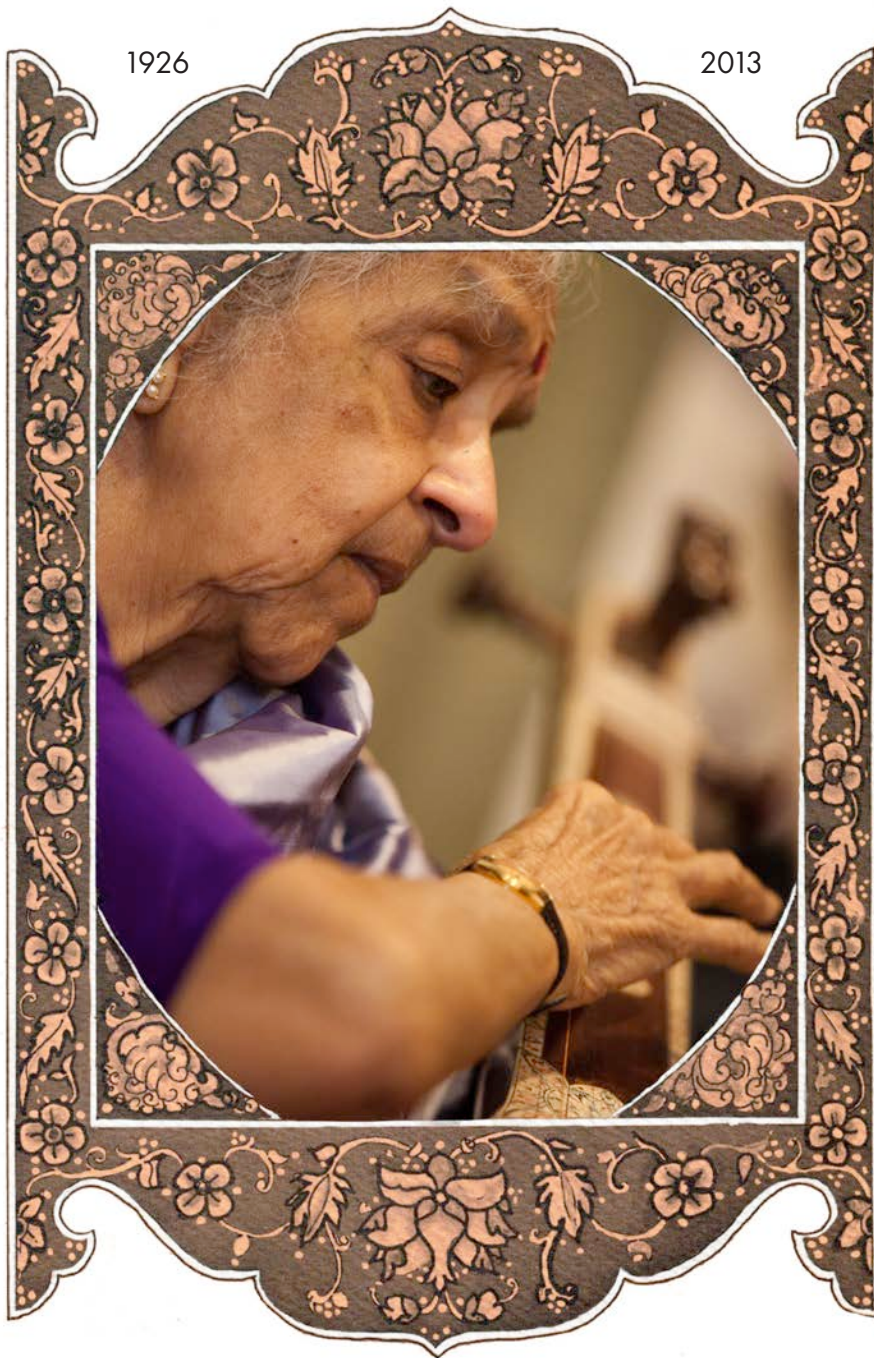

Ravi and Shashi Bellare Arts Foundation



The Ravi & Shashi Bellare Arts Foundation memorializes and implements the rich legacies of Pandit Taranath Rao, and Pandits Ravi and Shashi Bellare. The Foundation is a small non-profit that has had a significant impact on the Southern California community. The founders, Rupesh & Mona Kotecha, began promoting local California artists of Indian music and tabla by hosting intimate house concerts (or “dungals”) since 1983. As the years passed, and the foundation took flight, Rupesh and his wife Mona, began inviting master artists from around the world to showcase their expertise on the stage, and to act as workshop leaders for younger musicians and artists. Before our organization started hosting these events, one seldom heard a tabla solo in concert unless you attended a performance of one of the great masters. Seeing this as a crucial gap, our organization made it a point to open up the stage to other performers: from masters to amateurs.

The Foundation’s milestone event, Festival of Tabla, carries the goal to bring back the rich tradition of solo tabla performance at each event and to present many artists of various backgrounds. In particular, the project seeks to provide an unbiased platform for the highly underrepresented female tabla solo artists. Since 2017, the festival has grown by way of attendee numbers and performers. This growth is an example of the inclusive nature and ambience that is created and that attracts and engages all members (from performing artists to audience to volunteers) present during the two-day event. We have since, discovered an immense interest in the percussive arts of India because people are now able to experience a two-day festival and immerse themselves in various art-forms of India, especially the art of tabla solo. The festival has given life and hope to a new generation of performers.

Pandit Taranath Rao



The founder of the Festival of Tabla, Rupesh Kotecha, learned from Pandit Taranath Rao from 1983 - 1990. Pandit Taranath Rao is the uncle of Ravi & Shashi Bellare and taught the twins from a very young age the art of Tabla Duets. Ravi & Shashi played some of the most earliest (1940's) Tabla duets in India and brought out playing Julebani in Tabla. The twins became some of the most sought after Tabla players in the 50's, 60's and 70's.

Saneyee Purandare Bhattacharjee began her musical education at the age of six under the tutelage of Smt. Prabha Bakshi in Pune. After moving to America at the age of 16, she continued learning with Smt. Usha Sathe for a few years and then with Pt. Arun Dravid for a short while in Orange County. In 2011 she became a disciple of Vidushi Padma Talwalkar and has been under her guidance, and then the guidance of her senior disciple Yashaswi Sirpotdar since 2016. She also seeks guidance from Shri Srijan Deshpande and Smt. Shambhavi Dandekar.

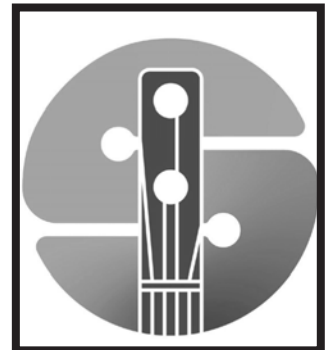
In 2013 she founded the Swaraswati School of Music in the Bay Area, California, to spread and nurture the love for Indian Classical Music among students. She teaches a thriving

community of students, organizes Baithaks of upcoming and established artists, and workshops by visiting Gurus.

As a performer, Saneyee has been featured in several public and private events in India and USA, like the San Jose-Pune Sister Cities Foundation, the San Francisco Ethnic Dance Festival, concerts by the India Community center, Rangmanch Theater with a Cause, the BMM 2024 convention in San Jose, to name a few.

She regularly composes musical pieces for Kathak artists and accompanies them on stage, like with Shambhavi's international school of Kathak, and the Chitresh Das Institute. She has also been featured on Bolly 92.3 fm in a segment on semi classical film music. Along with nurturing classical traditions, Saneyee also enjoys collaborating with other world musicians to create an eclectic fusion of music. Saneyee holds a degree in journalism, and also enjoys writing. She lives in Dublin, California with her husband and two kids.

Swaraswati school of music was founded in the Bay Area in 2013 by Saneyee Purandare Bhattacharjee to promote Indian classical music in the youth and the community through teaching, workshops, baithaks, and community events. We are based in Dublin California. Since 2023, we are also the official center for Bharati Vidyapeeth music exams in the Bay Area.



Robin Sukhadia is an arts leader, fundraiser, scholar, and tabla artist whose work bridges culture, philanthropy, and creative practice. He is a disciple of Pandit Swapan Chaudhuri and earned an MFA in World Music from the California Institute of the Arts. He serves as a Board member of the Ali Akbar College of Music, where he began his tabla studies in 2000.

A Fulbright Senior Research Scholar, Robin's academic and curatorial work explores classical Indian music, Indian cinema, music, cultural diplomacy, and the intersections of tradition and modernity. He is widely recognized for designing innovative programs that unite performance, scholarship, and community impact, including performances, museum talks, interdisciplinary lectures, and immersive multimedia events.

He currently serves as Director of Development at the University of Southern California's Thornton School of Music, where he leads major gifts strategy, donor engagement, and long-term philanthropic growth in support of one of the nation's premier music institutions. Prior to joining USC Thornton, Robin served as the Interim Development Director for the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra and Major Gifts Officer at the Colburn School.

Robin is deeply committed to advancing the arts through visionary leadership and storytelling. He currently resides in Los Angeles with his wife Neela and 2 sons, Kabir and Kailash. Learn more at www.tablapusher.com

From Arizona, he has performed at various cultural and classical music events through the Phoenix Gharana community. Alongside his musical pursuits, Rishabh is also deeply involved in academic research, community service, and varsity athletics. In the fall, he will be attending UCLA on a pre-med track.



Avichal Jha ●



Disciple of Ustad Shahid Parvez

Avichal Jha is a sitarist based in Los Angeles, and a senior disciple of Ustad Shahid Parvez Khan. His playing is rooted in the Etawah Gharana, a lineage celebrated for its lyrical depth and what its practitioners call the

singing sitar: a tradition where melody becomes feeling, and every note carries the weight of generations. Inspired by his father's deep love of melody, Avichal began his sitar studies at age 24. Since 2009, he has carried forward the legacy of the Etawah Gharana, performing at cultural festivals, private events, and concert halls across the United States. His collaborators include tabla player Jyotiprakash, flutist Aakash Pujara, and santoor player Kamaljeet Alhuwalia.



Ojas Bhargave ●

Disciple of Pandit Vikas Purandare

Born into a lineage of Hindustani classical music, Ojas began his journey with the Tabla at the age of three. He is a dedicated disciple of the esteemed maestro Pandit Vikas Purandare, a celebrated veteran staff artist of All India Radio who has also accompanied many legendary icons like Pt. Bhimsen Joshi, Pt. Hariprasad Chaurasia, and Pt. Jasraj. Through this lineage, Ojas inherits the core artistic values of his Param Guru, Pandit Ganesh Laxman (G. L.) Samant, a legacy centered on absolute tonal clarity (Khula Haath) and a highly analytical command over rhythmic mathematics.

This strict classical discipline served as the foundation for Ojas's active practice within Pune's live music and theater spaces, an evolution that began early as an All India Radio Baal Kalakar (child artist). Today, his work focuses on traditional classical solo recitals and accompaniment alongside diverse collaborative projects. Having previously performed live music and rearranged scores for theater plays, he has also brought his rhythmic foundation into contemporary spaces as a multi-instrumentalist performing with experimental ensembles. Rather than a departure from his classical roots, Ojas approaches these varied musical experiences as a direct extension of his lifelong devotion to the music.



Jim Santi Owen



Disciple of Pandit Swapan Chaudhuri



Jim Santi Owen is a percussionist, educator, and producer specializing in North and South Indian percussion traditions. A disciple of Pandit Swapan Chaudhuri since 1991, he has studied tabla at the Ali Akbar College of Music, the California Institute of the Arts, and in India. He has also studied South Indian percussion with T.H. Subash Chandran and thavil with K. Sekar. He has performed with artists including Pharoah Sanders, L. Shankar, George Brooks, Pandit Chitresh Das, Alonzo King LINES Ballet, and the San Francisco Ballet. Owen holds an M.A. in World Music from California Institute of the Arts and is a Fellow of the American Institute of Indian Studies.

In addition to performing, Owen is deeply engaged in arts education, cultural preservation, and arts leadership. He has taught at institutions including the California Jazz Conservatory, Dominican University of California, California Institute of the Arts, and the Ali Akbar College of Music. He previously served as Music Director of the San Francisco World Music Festival and currently serves as Vice-Chair of the Oakland Cultural Affairs Commission. As CEO of Jim Santi Owen Music, Inc., he produced more than 150 world music tracks for Meta's Sound Collection, collaborating with artists including T.H. Subash Chandran, Selva Ganesh, Ganesh Kumar, Alam Khan, and Sabir Khan; the music has been used in over 16 million pieces of content across Facebook and Instagram. He is also a key collaborator on the Swapan Chaudhuri Digital Tabla Library, a major archival and pedagogical initiative dedicated to preserving and expanding access to the tabla tradition for future generations.



Chirag Dixit ●

Disciple of Pt. Pankaj Mishra



Chirag has been learning Sarangi since 2013 from Pankaj Mishra of the Banaras Gharana. He previously studied Hindustani vocal music under Geeta Munshi. Chirag holds a degree in computer engineering.

Chirag is now being recognised by many artists locally. He is also a board member of The Ravi & Shashi Bellare Arts Foundation and has been a huge asset to the Festival of Tabla in organizing and grant writing. He also helps coordinate the Black Box Theater Workshops.

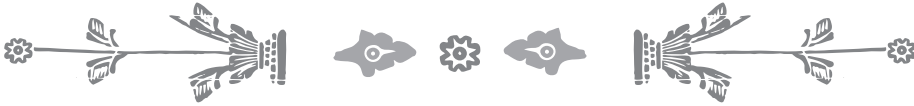
Aditya Sutar



Disciple of Rupak Kulkarni

Aditya Sutar is an emerging Indian Classical flautist and a “B High” Grade Artist of All India Radio, He is a disciple of Pt. Rupak Kulkarni and also receives guidance from renowned vocalist smt.Asawari Patwardhan ji. Alongside performing, he teaches aspiring students through the Pt. Rupak Kulkarni Flute Academy.

Aditya has performed at prestigious festivals and venues in India and abroad, including the Bangkok International Festival of Dance and Music, Dubai Opera, Dover Lane Music Conference, ICCR Delhi, and Pandit Bhimsen Joshi Sangeet Mahotsav. His recognitions include the NCPA Youth Scholarship (2024), Pt. Bhimsen Joshi Youth Scholarship, Kalaratna Award, Swarmani Award, and First Prize at the International Music Competition organized by Kor Institute of Music, Canada.



Ravi Venugopalan



Disciple of Pandit Anindo Chatterjee

Ravi Venugopalan is a Tabla Artist with over 10 years of training in the traditional Guru-Shishya parampara. He is a senior disciple of Pandit Anindo Chatterjee and his son shri Anubrata Chatterjee. Before that Ravi used to learn from Ustad Faiyaz Khan saheb, Dilli Gharana. Ravi Venugopalan preforms alongside with his Guruji Pt. Anindo Chatterjee in India and abroad five times to date.

Notably, his first performance with his Guru Pt. Anindo Chatterjee took place at the prestigious Abbaji's Gurupurnima in Mumbai in 2025. In addition to his accompanying with Pt. Anindo Chatterjee, he has performed with many more senior musicians.

He has performed in the USA and UAE and also teaches tabla internationally to students across different countries. Ravi has received awards including the Rooh E Ghazal Promising Young Tabla Player Award 2023 in the UAE and the Vocational Excellence Award 2016 from Rotary International.



Maxton Hunter

Disciple of Rajib Karmakar

"A tranquil soundscape that is sure to elevate the headspace around you." ~Aquarium Drunkard

Raised on a secluded ranch north of Santa Barbara, Maxton Hunter's imagination ran free, ultimately leading him to music at a very young age. Rather than identify with a single instrument, his truest voice can be found in the studio, blending psychedelic folk-rock, ambient soundscapes and Indian-fusion into what he calls 'Mystic Americana.' In 2021, Hunter joined the L.A. International Music & Arts Academy, where he met his guru Rajib Karmakar. This mentorship, along with his immersion in the FOT community, ignited a deeper artistic purpose of bridging Western and Eastern musical traditions.



Beyond these solo pursuits, Hunter is a member of the soul-blues band East Valley Road, ambient ensemble Academy of Light, as well as the live drummer for singer-songwriter Evan Blix.



Ginger Rose



Ginger Rose Brucker is a Los Angeles-based harpist, educator, recording artist, and composer. She holds degrees from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and University of California, Los Angeles, and performs across California for weddings, private events, concerts, and orchestral engagements.

Ginger's versatility extends to studio work and high-profile collaborations.

She is also the co-founder of Coalesce Duo, a harp and flute ensemble known for its refined blend of classical and contemporary music. In addition to performing, Ginger maintains a private harp studio in Los Angeles, teaching students of all levels.



Soulmate - Nate Alpin 🌸

Soulmate explores the world of keyboard synthesis, and blends these cosmic sounds with field recordings captured on Earth, and creates music of an other-worldly quality. Nate Alpin (aka Soulmate) is currently based in Laguna Hills, California & has 23 years of experience playing piano, 8 years of production with Ableton, and has created original compositions solo and in collaboration with his friends. He is trained in Western & Jazz Theory from Moorpark College and studied audio engineering at Los Angeles Recording School. His sound is greatly influenced by the creations of Brian Eno, Erik Satie, and Boards of Canada.



Miles Shrewsbery

Disciple of Pandit Abhiman Kaushal and Pandit Nandkumar Bhatlouande

Miles Shrewsbery III is a performer and educator of the North Indian classical drum, tabla. He received his ongoing training from Pandit Abhiman Kaushal and Pandit Nandkumar Bhatlouande of Hyderabad, India. Miles has performed all over the world with top Indian classical musicians, jazz artists, and pop stars such as Shujaat Khan, Deepak Ram, Googoosh, Cheap Trick, and Yusef Lateef.

Some notable soundtracks and recordings where Miles' tabla and percussion can be found are, Sinbad (Dreamworks 2003), The Rundown (Columbia 2003), The Riches (FX 2007), Yusef Lateef and Adam Rudolph – Into the Garden (Meta Records 2003), Dave Stringer – Divas and Devas (Spirit Voyage 2007), and Dave Stringer – Yatra (Silenzio 2011). In 2004, Miles earned a B.A. in ethnomusicology from UCLA, and in 2009, he earned an M.A. in ethnomusicology from UCR. In 2012 Miles was awarded the American Institute of Indian Studies' Senior Performing Arts Fellowship which helped support further studies and practice in New Delhi, India for one year. Currently, Miles is a lecturer at UCLA teaching tabla, as well as an Artist-Teacher in Residence for the Center for World Music in San Diego, while managing his own school, San Diego Tabla Academy.



🌀 FOT SHORT - The Sound of the Tippi 🌀

Master percussionist Leonice Shinneman brings a rare and inventive folk instrument to the stage: the Tippi. Originating as a simple South Indian village instrument, the Tippi consists of a polished coconut shell played with ringed fingers to produce surprisingly complex, expressive rhythms. Inspired by percussion legends John Bergamo, Vikku Vinayakram, and Muruges— and built by hand using a buffed coconut shell and finger rings—Leonice adapts traditional tabla and ghatam rhythmic bols (such as KTTK TRKT) onto this humble material. His performance bridges traditional folk craft, North and South Indian rhythmic discipline, and creative DIY ingenuity.

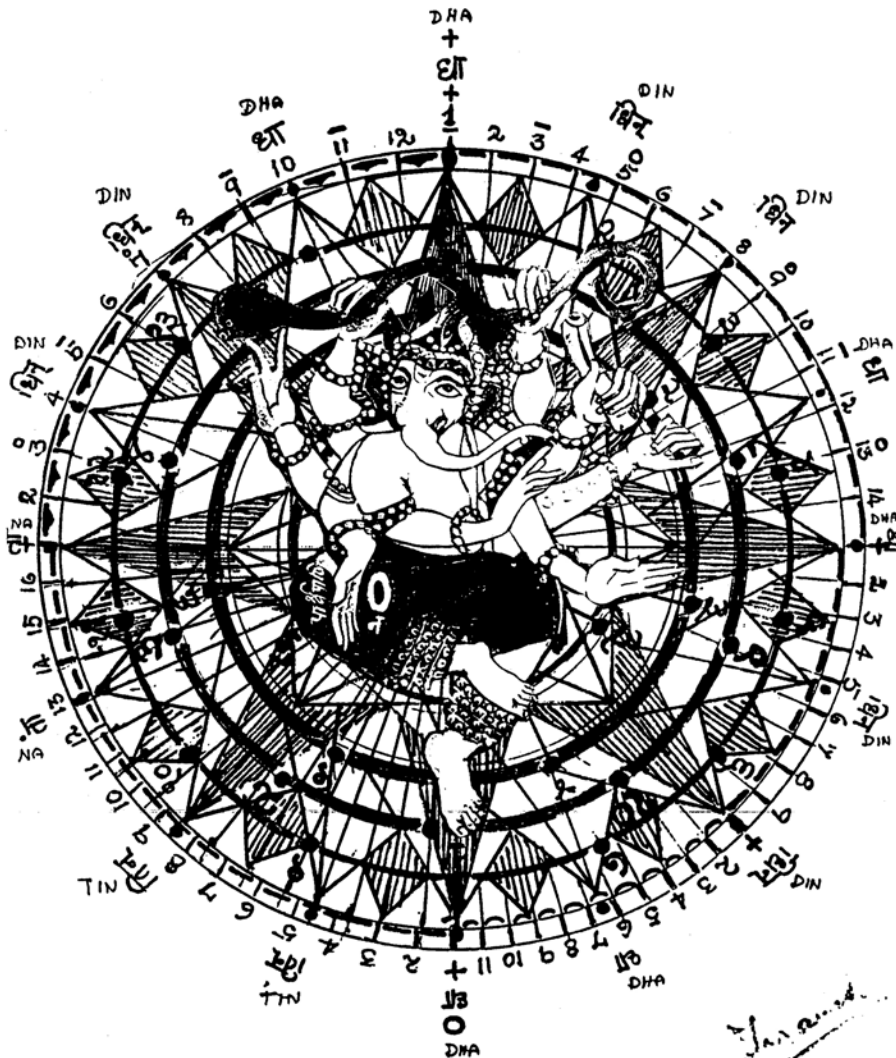

Disciple of Shri Anjaneya Sastry & Pandit Yogesh Samsi

Twelve-year-old Varenja Sastry started his training at a young age under the tutelage of his father, Shri Anjaneya Sastry, and is currently a student of Pandit Yogesh Samsi ji. He has also had the cherished privilege of attending workshops and learning directly from the world-renowned Ustad Zakir Hussain ji in 2024. Varenja was also featured as a solo performer in the prestigious Festival of Tabla in 2022. He has performed in several local and international events both as an accompanist and a tabla solo-ist!



Mehar-Jot Singh Sagoo 🕉️

Disciple of Ustad Surdarshan Singh Chana

Mehar-Jot Singh Sagoo is an 20-year-old Indian Classical Jori and Tabla artist from the U.K. He is a dedicated student of the internationally renowned Ustaad Surdarshan Singh Chana, who he began learning from at the age of 6. Mehar-Jot Singh engages in weekly lessons and summer intensive retreats, both as a student and youth mentor, to support his practice as a growing musician. Mehar-Jot's playing style draws heavily on the Benaras and Punjab Gharanas, learning an extensive repertoire of authentic compositions that have been passed down through the ages.

Academically, Mehar-Jot is currently in his second year of University, studying Music Psychology and performance. He hopes to work within the field of Musical therapy; looking into the effects of music on mental health at a deeper neurological level.

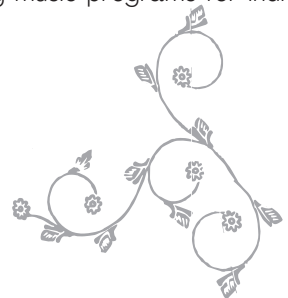


Pratyush Goberdhan ●

Student of Pt. Arijit Mahalanabis & Ut. Sarwar Hussain Khan

Pratyush is a student of Pt. Arijit Mahalanabis. He began learning from his first guru and grandfather the late Sri Hari Shanker Adesh and his mother Smt. Surabhi Adesh mainly focusing on vocal and violin. He first started learning the sarangi during the pandemic under the guidance of Pt Pankaj Mishra. As well he recently started learning with Ut. Sarwar Hussain Khan.

Alongside his mother and the Asian Cultural Association (ACA) of Orlando, Pratyush uses his music to engage with the larger Central Florida community by teaching classes, conducting workshops, helping organize events, as well as facilitating music programs for individuals with special needs.

Rukhmani Mehta is a Kathak artist, choreographer, and educator working at the intersection of classical Indian dance, contemporary performance, and embodied inquiry. She approaches kathak as a living, evolving practice — one that bridges tradition and innovation while speaking powerfully to the present moment. A senior disciple of the legendary kathak master Pandit Chitresh Das, she is a lineage bearer and contemporary voice whose work spans traditional productions and cross-cultural collaborations.

Mehta is Co-Founder and Co-Artistic Director of Leela Dance Collective. Her original works include SPEAK, a kathak-tap collaboration, described by the New York Times as a meeting of “masters of the art”; and Sandhi, a traditional Kathak solo praised for its “rhythmic duality” and “improvisational depth.” Her works and performances have been presented at prestigious venues across the US and India including the

National Centre for the Performing Arts (Mumbai), 92nd Street Y, The Broad Stage, and NC State Live, among others.

Mehta also serves as Artistic Director of Leela Youth Dance Company, a pre-professional ensemble dedicated to training and mentoring young South Asian women. A Fulbright Award recipient, she is frequently invited to speak on embodied knowledge, lineage and mentorship, and dance as a path to consciousness and transformation.

Rukhmani will be accompanied with vocal support by her Guru Ben Sarah Morelli and recitation support by Rukhmani’s student, Shriya Patel.



Jayanta Banerjee

Disciple of Pandit Robi Chakroborty

Jayanta Banerjee is an internationally acclaimed Sitarist and Music Composer whose concerts have reached audiences and stalwarts all around. Not only a Sitarist, but Jayanta Banerjee is an expert in playing different musical instruments like Sarod, Harmonium, Keyboards and is a melodious singer too.

He has curated his own festival “Sambandh” that brings dance, music and theatre under one roof, propagating art and the Baithaki culture. The festival has over 100 musicians and dancers associated with it. He is one of the few to have bagged Apple Inc. His rhythm on the sitar is used for the app “Nagma Live” owned by Apple Inc.

Jayanta started his journey under the able guidance of Shri Amit Prasanna Mukhopadhyay. Later continued his training under the tutelage of Shri Devi Prasad Chattopadhyay. Progressing ahead, he continued to receive his training in both Rampur Gharana and Maihar Gharana under the guidance of Pt. Santosh Bandopadhyay, later advancing his learning under Pandit Robi Chakroborty, disciple of Ustad Ali Akbar Khan Saheb.

Disciple of Ustad Zakir Hussain



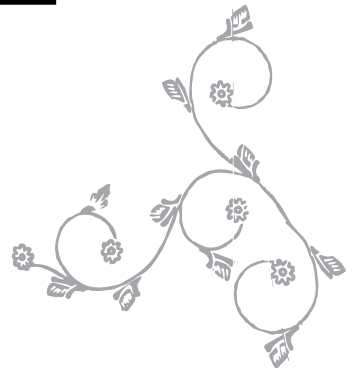
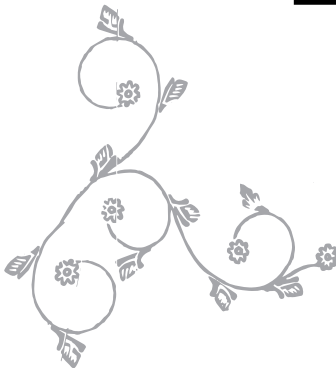
Hailed as “one of the most prominent of the next generation of tabla players” by the Los Angeles Times, Salar Nader is recognized as a virtuoso and global ambassador weaving South Asian arts into the musical traditions of his Afghanistan heritage. A percussionist, composer, and producer, Salar studied under Ustad Zakir Hussain since the age of seven. He has toured widely with Kronos Quartet, Wu Man, Stanley Clarke, Miles From India, and Third Coast Percussion; Central Asian master musicians Homayoun Sakhi, Abbas Kosimov, and the Aga Khan Music Initiative; and legendary Indian classical musicians including Ustad Zakir Hussain, Ustad Amjad Ali Khan, Rahul Sharma, Rakesh Chaurasia, and many others. Salar scored the original stage

adaptation of Khaled Hosseini’s best-selling novel “The Kite Runner,” which had a groundbreaking run on Broadway in 2022 and national tour in 2024. He has performed and recorded with contemporary electronic artists including Cheb i Sabbah, Niyaz, and Grand Tapestry. In 2025, Salar premiered Zakir Hussain’s “Murmurs in Time” with Third Coast Percussion, for whom the piece was written, and he continues to tour with them internationally. Recently Salar performed with the Bang On a Can All-Stars in a 90th birthday tribute to Terry Riley at the Ford in Los Angeles, produced by the LA Philharmonic. Salar continues his dedication to community engagement, workshops, and cross-cultural understanding.

Waruna Hemachandra is a distinguished Sri Lankan percussionist, composer, and choreographer, renowned for his mastery of the traditional drums of the island. Waruna's artistic journey began at the age of six, and his passion for rhythm led him to pursue formal education in percussion at the University of the Visual and Performing Arts in Colombo, where he honed his skills. In 2012, Waruna founded his own percussion band, "Dinaadah," which quickly rose to prominence as one of Colombo's leading ensembles. After completing his studies, Waruna served as a lead drum instructor and a primary drummer at the prestigious Chitrasena Dance Company, Sri Lanka's oldest performing arts institution. In 2022, Waruna and his wife/dance partner, Sandani Sulochani, moved to the US where they now teach and perform dance and drums under their company, SandaWaruna Art of Dance.



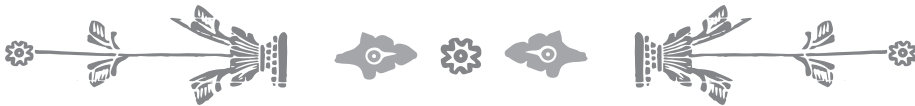

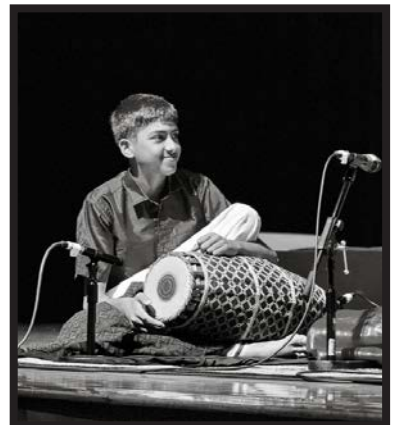

Grand Master - Ustad Tari Khan 🌸

Saturday Night Grand Finale Artist

In the realm of South Asian music, when it comes to percussionists emanating from the subcontinent the name of Ustad Tari Khan is inseparable from Tabla. Born in Lahore Pakistan, Tari Khan hails from a family of musicians whose lineage can be traced back to Bhai Mardana. Tari Khan's father was a classical vocalist of great virtuosity and his early education in music was that of a singer. However, Tari Khan listened to the tabla of Ustad Shaukat Hussain Khan at the age of six and became so enamored with the celebrated Ustad that all his musical interests became focused on Tabla. He spent the next eight years of his life listening to Ustad Shaukat Hussain at concerts, on the radio, at private mehfilis (musical gatherings) and on television. At fourteen, he formally became a student of Ustad Shaukat Hussain Khan. Three years later he performed at the death anniversary of Mian Qadir Baksh. That



solo performance earned him a revered place amongst the Tabla greats of all time. Ustad Tari Khan had arrived. There has been no looking back for Tari Khan. Today, he is acknowledged as one of the foremost Tabla players of all time by musicians all over the world.

Ustad Tari Khan has performed in virtually every part of the world, participating in prestigious festivals and concerts, dazzling and captivating audiences by his extraordinary versatility. His work has led to collaborations with artists and producers from all spectrums of the musical world, including collaboration with famed producer Rick Rubin. He has also composed music for several documentaries and films such as Mira Nair's Mississippi Masala starring Denzel Washington. Ustad Tari Khan has received the highest acclaim for both his accompaniment and solo performances. He has been crowned with the title of "Tabla Prince of India and Pakistan", decorated with the prestigious Hazrat Ameer Khusro Award, decorated with the President's Pride of Performance (Pakistan's highest artistic honor), and crowned during Taj Posh (Golden Crown).

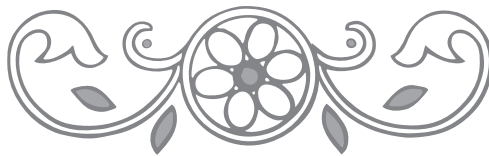

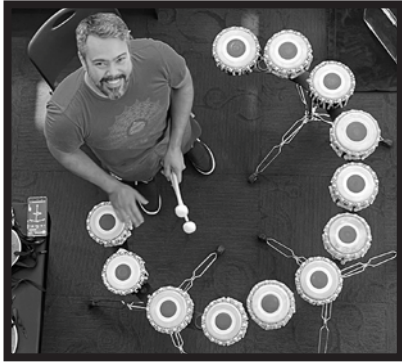

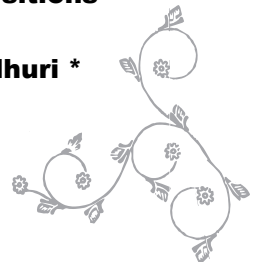

Workshop will be a combination of a live demonstration and a workshop, exploring the five percussive instruments of all three of Sri Lanka's traditional performing art forms: Kandyan, Low-Country, and Sabaragamuwa. The drumming will be accompanied by live dancing.

Sandani Sulochani is a renowned dancer and choreographer from Sri Lanka. She began performing at age seven. She has won over twelve dance awards from the Ministry of Education

in Sri Lanka during her youth. She received both her Bachelors and Masters of Arts in Dance at the University of Kelaniya in Sri Lanka. Sandani also holds a National Diploma in Choreography from the Sri Lanka Foundation Institute in Colombo and earned a certificate from the Chitrasena-Vajira School of Dance's Teacher Training Program. Sandani's graduate research provides an in-depth overview of Vajira Chitrasena, Sri Lanka's first professional female Kandyan dancer, and the dance pedagogy she developed.

After receiving her graduate degrees, Sandani became a frequent guest lecturer at the University of Kelaniya and Ladies' College while teaching and performing as one of the lead members of the acclaimed Chitrasena Dance Company. With her husband and drummer, Waruna Hemachadnra, Sandani is now the co-founder of the US-based dance company and school, SandaWaruna Art of Dance.

Gunindu "Guni" Abeysekera is a Sri Lankan-American artist and scholar. Born in Sri Lanka, Guni moved to the US with his family in the year 2000 when he was 2 years-old. Guni's main creative practice is through photography and filmmaking, but he is also a graphic designer, poet, dramaturg for various performances, and beginner Kandyan drummer and dancer. He enjoys collaborating with South Asian artists in the diaspora and now in Sri Lanka as well.

Qaida: Demystifying Tabla Improvisation

Ravi Deo is a composer, tabla artist, and educator whose art explore the relationship between sound, place, and collective memory. Drawing from South Asian and Western musical traditions, he works across interdisciplinary projects that connect artistic traditions, communities, and generations. A disciple of the late Pt. Ramesh Kumar, Deo holds degrees from UCLA and CalArts, where he received multiple honors and studied under Professor Abhiman Kaushal and Pt. Swapan Chaudhuri.

Qaida is one of the central compositional and improvisational forms of the tabla solo tradition. Built from a simple theme, a qaida unfolds through a series of variations that balance creativity with adherence to established musical rules. This workshop explores how tabla players develop, organize, and present these variations in performance, revealing the artistic and structural principles that make qaida a cornerstone of Hindustani percussion repertoire. Through live demonstrations and guided listening, participants will gain insight into the relationship between composition and improvisation, and learn how a single musical idea can generate an entire performance.



Mharo Pranam: A tribute to Vidushi Lakshmi Shankar and the enduring legacy of Patiala Gharana

A Musical Journey: Honoring Vidushi Lakshmi Shankar
Join Vidushi Sudakshina Alagia for an immersive tribute to the legendary Vidushi Lakshmi Shankar, weaving together history, musicology, and live performance into an engaging musical journey.

The workshop opens with a welcoming introduction to the core foundations of Hindustani classical music, demystifying the traditional concept of the gharana (stylistic school) before focusing on the expressive soul of the Patiala gharana. Through rare audio-visual media—including historical photographs and vintage recordings—participants will trace the rich artistic lineage linking Ustad Abdur Rahman Khan to Lakshmi Shankar.



Moving beyond passive listening, the workshop invites attendees to actively engage by synthesizing simple melodic phrases together. Following an open Q&A segment, the experience culminates in a breathtaking live performance by Sudakshina Alagia, demonstrating the hallmark vocal agility, emotive depth, and unique strengths that define the Patiala tradition.

Vidushi Lakshmi Shankar

Vidushi Lakshmi Shankar, the internationally renowned vocalist, was born on June 16, 1926, to Vaidhyathan Sastri (R. V. Sastri) and Visalakshi. Both parents were from South India, but from different regions: her father was from the Madras Presidency, in what is now Tamil Nadu, while her mother came from an adjoining area of present-day Kerala. Mr. Sastri trained as a lawyer but chose to work as a chartered accountant. Soon after their marriage, he moved to Jamshedpur (now in the state of Jharkhand), the "Steel Town," where he worked for the Tata Iron and Steel Company (TISCO). Lakshmi, as I addressed her, was born and raised in Jamshedpur. As a child, she trained in Bharatanatyam, and her dance education included singing classical music in the Karnatak style (South Indian classical music).

In her teens, Lakshmi joined the famous dancer and dance choreographer Uday Shankar's troupe in Almora as one of the dancers. It was here she met her future husband and younger brother of Uday Shankar, Rajendra Shankar, whom she married in 1944. While pursuing a dancing career, she was struck with a serious medical condition, which made her give up her beloved dancing forever. Fortunately, a beautiful voice and a good background in singing Karnatak style served her well. After their wedding, Lakshmi and Rajendra settled in Mumbai. She was a mother of renowned recording engineer Kumar, who worked with the Beatles and daughter Viji Subramaniam, a vocalist, who tragically passed away from a brain tumor in 1995. While singing jingles for radio ads and a few playbacks singing for early Bollywood movies, Music director Madan Mohan recognized her tremendous potential and introduced her to her vocal music Guru, Ustad Abdul Rehman Khan of Patiala Gharana, from whom she took vigorous lessons over many years. When she started learning Hindustani (North Indian) music, she was a full-time mother and homemaker. Later, Lakshmi also took lessons from her young brother-in-law, Pandit Ravi Shankar. As a vocalist, Lakshmi specialized in singing Khyals, Thumris and bhajans. Pandit Ravi Shankar when asked about female Indian vocalists, said he regarded M.S. Subbalakshmi, Lata Mangeshkar and Lakshmi Shankar as the best female vocalists of Indian music of all times!

She toured widely in India and other countries and gave countless performances. She was the principal vocalist in Sir Richard Attenborough's famous movie "Gandhi", which was internationally acclaimed. She has sung in many formats: Khyal, Thumri, Bhajans, Jazz, Bollywood, and sung in duets with artistes of other genres. She was nominated for an Emmy and won many awards. Lakshmi has sung in both Hindustani and Karnatak styles, and in many Indian regional languages and in English as well!

I was fortunate to be accepted as a student by her. Since I lived in Simi Valley, the same town where she and her son Kumar's family lived, and that too, less than a mile and a half from her, I made full use of it. She was one of the kindest individuals I knew, and was an excellent teacher, role model and mother figure. I enjoyed accompanying her to local concerts, where she was frequently the chief guest. We would listen to a variety of music during those journeys, and she would explain the finer details of the ragas and styles.

She passed away on December 30, 2013, after a brief illness. We miss her presence a lot, but she lives in our pleasant memories, her many recordings and the 200 plus lessons I recorded with her kind consent. We, her students, and her family members celebrated her birth centenary with tributes and recital of music to honor her on June 27, 2026. This year at the Festival of Tabla her disciple, Vidushi Sudakshina Alagia, will present a concert and workshop in memory of Lakshmi ji, the great musical soul who lived right here in Simi Valley, California.

Jimmy Sudekum

Student of Madhuvanti Pal



Jimmy Sudekum is a video editor and producer based in Los Angeles, though music has always been his first language. A lifelong instrumentalist rooted in marching band and classical guitar, he arrived at Hindustani music through sitar study under Paul Livingstone, one of the few American disciples of Pt. Ravi Shankar. Workshops and private lessons with Ramakant Gundecha pulled him deeper still, opening a door into the ancient world of dhrupad he has not stopped walking through since.

That immersion led him, as if by inevitability, to the rudra veena. He has studied the instrument under Madhuvanti Pal in the Bishnupur Gharana tradition, and in 2025 had a Bishnupur-style rudra veena built under her direction. The Festival of Tabla marks his debut public performance on it.



FOT Short Takeda Drum by David Neptune

David Neptune is a percussionist based in Los Angeles whose musical voice draws on a lifetime of immersion in Japanese and world music traditions. Born and raised in Japan, David grew up performing alongside his father, renowned shakuhachi master John Kaizan Neptune, developing a percussive style shaped by influences spanning India, Japan, Latin America, and Africa. The two have performed together in concert halls across the globe. Central to David's musical life is the Takeda Drum, a percussion instrument invented by John Kaizan Neptune. Inspired by the udu drum and crafted 100% from bamboo, the Takeda has a warm, resonant voice entirely its own, and can be played utilizing techniques drawn from many percussion traditions, including the Batá drum and the mridangam. David now produces and manufactures the instrument in Taiwan, carrying forward the world music philosophy he inherited from his father.

David opens his set with a demonstration of the Takeda Drum, walking the audience through the instrument's origins, construction, and sonic range. Crafted 100% from bamboo and inspired by the udu drum, the Takeda produces a warm, resonant sound unlike any other percussion instrument, capable of techniques drawn from many traditions including the Batá drum and the mridangam. David illustrates these possibilities hands-on, inviting the audience into the world of an instrument that is at once ancient in spirit and entirely new, before moving into a solo demonstration.



Vidushi Sudakshina Alagia •

Disciple of Vidushi Lakshmi Shankar & Vidushi Purnima Choudhuri

A multi award winning singer and leading disciple of legendary late Vidushi Lakshmi Shankar and Vidushi Purnima Choudhuri, Sudakshina started singing from the early age of 9. She has meticulously honed and created a unique singing style that combines the tonal perfection and melodious nature of Patiala Gharana and the rustic and emotional singing of Banaras gharana. Sudakshina is equally versed in singing pure classical as well as thumri, dadra, ghazal, kajri, chaiti that are rich in romantic essence, and bhajans that are rich in devotional qualities and evoke a deep spirituality in the listener.



Rohit Panchakshari

Disciple of Ustad Zakir Hussain



Rohit A. Panchakshari began his musical journey in Nashik, India, under the guidance of Pt. Bhanudas Pawar and Nitin Pawar. Drawn to the profound depth of the Punjab Gharana, he has been studying under Guru Narendra Khot, a senior disciple of the legendary Ustad Allarakha Khansaheb. His pursuit of excellence continues through advanced taalim with Guru Pt. Supreet Deshpande, a torchbearer of the Farrukhabad tradition and disciple of Pt. Kiran Deshpande and Taalyogi Pt. Suresh Talwalkar. Rohit has been deeply blessed to receive the guidance of Tabla maestro Ustad Zakir Hussain for over a decade, participating in his annual masterclasses—an experience that continues to shape his musical vision. Balancing tradition with innovation, Rohit complements his artistic path with academic rigor. He holds a Ph.D. in Immunology from Harvard Medical School and currently works in Translational Sciences at Johnson & Johnson in San Diego, bringing the same devotion to science as he does to music.

Aryan Prakash Student of Shri Tanmay Deochake

Currently an undergraduate student at UC San Diego, Aryan Prakash has learnt harmonium, or samvadini, under the tutelage of his gurus - Shri Partho Roy Choudharyji (disciple of Ustad Amjad Ali Khan saheb) and Shri Adarsh Saxena ji (disciple of Pt Arun Bhaduri ji) and is currently continuing his musical journey under Shri Tanmay Deochake ji. Aryan has begun his musical journey in Southern California by accompanying esteemed artists such as Srimati Srivani Jade ji, and Gaayatri ji and hopes to continue his journey further as a student of music here.

The Festival of Tabla welcomes one of Kerala's most powerful percussion traditions: the chenda. Carved from jackfruit wood, this ancient drum features two contrasting sides—the sharp, high-pitched Edamthala and the resonant bass Valamthala—creating a thunderous soundscape born from centuries of temple and festival traditions.

Where the tabla speaks with melodic intricacy, the chenda answers with raw power and precision. This profound rhythmic connection was immortalized in 2017 when Kerala's temple drums and the late Ustad Zakir Hussain shared a historic stage. As the global music community continues to honor Ustad Zakir Hussain's immense legacy, this performance stands as a quiet tribute to the artistic bridges he built across Indian percussion traditions.



Carrying forward this spirit of cultural preservation, Empire Beats was formed in 2021 by Malayalee families in Eastvale, Riverside County. Now one of Southern California's most active ensembles, the group brings together nearly 20 multigenerational performers. On August 23, Empire Beats will present a vibrant six-member ensemble showcasing Shinkari Melam—a celebratory form full of energy and synchronization, bringing the authentic, beating heart of Kerala directly to the Festival of Tabla audience.

Arun Ramamurthi is an accomplished Carnatic violinist and senior disciple of the renowned Delhi Shri P. Sunder Rajan. Based in Orange County, California, he is a highly sought-after violin accompanist who has performed alongside legendary artists including Madurai T.N. Seshagopalan, Sudha Raghunathan, and Dr. Trichy Sankaran. In addition to his expertise on the violin, Arun is also a trained vocalist, having studied under Smt. Padma Kutty and the late Vairamangalam Lakshminarayanan.

Deeply committed to nurturing the next generation, Arun has been teaching violin to young students for over 15 years. He is the founder of MaargaUSA, a nonprofit organization established in 2015 to support and promote emerging musicians. He has also contributed to the community through his service as a board member of the South Indian Music Academy in Los Angeles.

Aditya Ganesh

Disciple of Pt. Pankaj Mishra

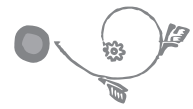

Sarangi



Suhail Yusuf, (stage name: Suhail Yusuf Khan), earned his Ph.D. in ethnomusicology from Wesleyan University in 2024. He is a renowned hereditary sarangi player, a traditional North Indian bowed instrument, and the first Ph.D. recipient from the Mirāsi, a community of Muslim musicians in South Asia. His research effectively combines musical expertise with scholarly rigor, delving into the political and emotional dimensions of marginalized Muslim musician communities and social movements.

Dr. Yusuf has held music residencies at prestigious institutions such as UCLA, Dartmouth, MIT, Wellesley College, University of Pennsylvania and Oxford University. He served as the Visiting Assistant Professor of Music History at the University of Hartford's Hartt School of Music, Dance, and Theater from 2021 to 2024. With an international career spanning over twenty-five years in performance, alongside notable creative and scholarly contributions, he has participated in the production of over twenty music albums and secured a signing with Domino Records in the U.K.

Currently, Dr. Yusuf is a Chancellor's Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of California, Santa Cruz, collaborating with Professor Dard Neuman on transcribing and analyzing performances from hereditary Mirāsi lineages. He is utilizing the interactive digital transcription method pioneered by Professor Neuman. In addition to this research, he is in the process of writing his first book, tentatively titled "Mirāsitude: Interfaith and Inclusive Ways of Resistance in North India and Beyond."



Grand Master - Pandit Anindo Chatterjee



Pandit Anindo Chatterjee is one of the most celebrated and distinguished musicians, revered worldwide as a legendary master of the Tabla. His remarkable musical journey began at the age of 10, when he was blessed on stage by the great Ustad Amir Khan Sahib, an auspicious moment that foreshadowed an extraordinary artistic destiny. Spanning nearly six decades, his illustrious career has been marked by unparalleled artistry, uncompromising excellence, and an enduring dedication to the rich traditions of Indian classical music. Today, Pandit Anindo Chatterjee stands among the foremost icons of Indian music, inspiring generations of musicians and music lovers across the globe.

Pandit Anindo Chatterjee has shared his artistry with audiences in nearly sixty countries, performing at world's most prestigious venues and festivals. In 1989, he achieved the distinction of performing at the House of Commons of the British Parliament as one of the youngest Indian musicians. A respected cultural ambassador of India, he has represented the nation's musical heritage across the globe. Since 1990, he has been recognized as a Top Grade Artist by the ICCR, All India Radio, and Doordarshan.

A dedicated guru as well as a celebrated performer, Pandit Anindo Chatterjee has nurtured and inspired numerous disciples across India, including his son, the acclaimed tabla player Anubrata Chatterjee. Anindo ji is Renowned for his profound mastery of all Gharana traditions of Tabla, He is celebrated for his unmatched clarity, dazzling speed, flawless precision, and distinctive style. Through his artistry, scholarship, and mentorship, he continues to enrich Indian classical music and remains one of its most treasured exponents.

Pandit Anindo Chatterjee has performed at the Rashtrapati Bhavan and also had the honour of performing for President Barack Obama during his visit to India in 2010. He is a recipient of numerous prestigious honours, including the Sangeet Natak Akademi Award (2002), presented by Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam. With a distinguished recording career spanning over four decades, he has contributed extensively to the world of Indian classical music through a wide range of acclaimed albums.

A living legend, Pandit Anindo Chatterjee continues to inspire generations of musicians and music lovers worldwide.

Michael is excited to reengage with the influences of Indian music as a source of inspiration to his playing!

The workshop will have a goal of how to incorporate Indian music on the saxophone to expand improvisation vocabulary.

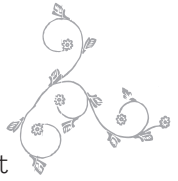
The workshop will cover basic Indian music grammar and what challenges might be encountered on western instruments.

Through personal story and live demonstration, audiences will encounter the parampara not as history but as a living tradition — one with the power to transform everyone it touches.



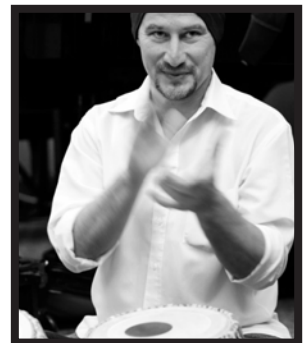
Mapping Bols on the Body: Making Indian Rhythms Accessible Through Body Percussion

This interactive workshop explores how foundational concepts from North and South Indian rhythm traditions can be translated into body percussion, vocalization, and movement-based ensemble practice. Drawing from tabla and konnakol pedagogy, participants will learn how rhythmic syllables (bols), cyclic structures, subdivision systems, and compositional forms can be embodied through clapping, stepping, vocal percussion, and coordinated movement.

A central focus of the workshop is making the sophistication of Indian rhythmic systems approachable, physical, and accessible to learners of all backgrounds. By translating complex rhythmic ideas into embodied exercises, participants will develop an intuitive understanding of pulse, subdivision, phrase structure, and rhythmic interplay without requiring prior training in Indian music. This approach is especially effective for introducing Indian rhythm to children, classroom settings, dancers, and non-musicians, creating an immediate and engaging entry point into rhythmic learning through movement and play. Developed through decades of teaching in classrooms, workshops, and community music settings, these methods have been refined through extensive practical application with students of diverse ages, backgrounds, and experience levels. The workshop also serves as a model for tabla artists and rhythm educators seeking practical strategies for sharing Indian rhythmic concepts with broader audiences in clear, engaging, and participatory ways.



Her Voice - Women Composers in Hindustani Music 🌸

Women have been learning and singing Hindustani (North Indian Classical) music for over two centuries. The first students of Khayal were female, and the first recording of a female singing voice in Hindustani Music (1902) is of Gauhar Jan, the renowned tawaif (courtesan) and classical musician from Kolkata. But rarely does one find bandishes attributed to women composers. This seems curious since much of Khayal is improvised music, and in a sense, one is always composing. Perhaps they did not compose in deference to their Ustads/Gurus or shadow-wrote under a different pen-name, much like Victorian era women writers?

With Hirabai Badodekar and Saraswati Rane (daughters of Kirana Gharana founder Abdul Karim Khan Saheb) achieving status and popularity as gharanedaar khayaliyas of their time, and Marathi theater bringing classical based natyasangeet to the masses, the tide turned for women in Hindustani. Since then they have reclaimed their space in public, as prolific musicians, composers and teachers. This program by Srivani Jade Ensemble presents compositions by women artists over the ages, and restores credit to their genius and creativity. From devotional composers like Meera Bai and Pratapbala, to Thumri singers like Girija Devi and Naina Devi to Khayal singers Prabha Atre, Veena Sahasrabuddhe and Ashwini Bhide, and now Srivani herself - we will hear a variety of beautiful compositions born out of the minds of women and their experiences.



Hearing Listening: Sravanum Srithiyum - Technology Assisted Immersion and Accessibility in Indian Performing Arts

Nivrritii (Nivi) Mahesh is a rising young Bharatanatyam dancer, student, and advocate for accessibility



in the performing arts. A high school senior from Connecticut, she has trained in Bharatanatyam since the age of six under the guidance of her mother and guru, Aishwarya Chakravarthy, Artistic Director of Natyakshetram School of Dance. Nivi has performed extensively in the United States and India, appearing in prestigious productions and venues while balancing a strong academic record with a deep commitment to the arts. She is a recipient of the India Arts Foundation Research Grant and a member of the International Dance Council (CID-UNESCO)

A bilateral cochlear implant recipient and world record holder, Nivi is recognized for pioneering the use of assistive technology in

Indian classical dance. In 2026, she became the first bilateral cochlear implant recipient to perform a full Bharatanatyam Margam with a live orchestra, demonstrating how tradition and innovation can work together to make the arts more inclusive. Through performances, research, and community outreach initiatives, she seeks to expand access to Indian classical arts for audiences and artists of diverse abilities and backgrounds. Her journey continues to inspire others by showing that excellence in the arts is defined by dedication, creativity, and a willingness to reimagine what is possible.



Rishabh Kaushik (17) is a Los Angeles-based vocalist and keyboardist carrying forward a distinguished Carnatic lineage traceable to legends Vid. Thanjavur Vaidyanatha Iyer and Palghat Ghatam Sundaram. Under the guidance of Vid. K.N. Shashikiran and Vid. Sivaralaxmi Maya Abhishek, he made his debut at age nine during Chennai's Margazhi season. Over the past eight years, Rishabh has delivered over 120 international concerts across six countries.



Deeply committed to accessible arts, Rishabh leads the "Service Through Music" initiative, teaching neurodiverse youth, collaborating with disabled artists, and incorporating Cymatics and sign language to make concerts accessible to the hearing-impaired. A recipient of the India Art Foundation research grant, his achievements have been featured in major outlets including The Hindu and The Times of India.

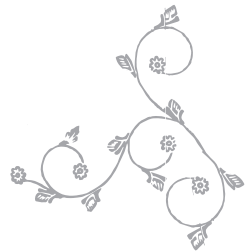
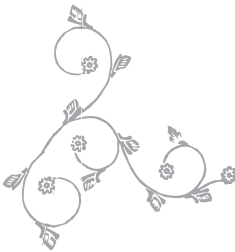

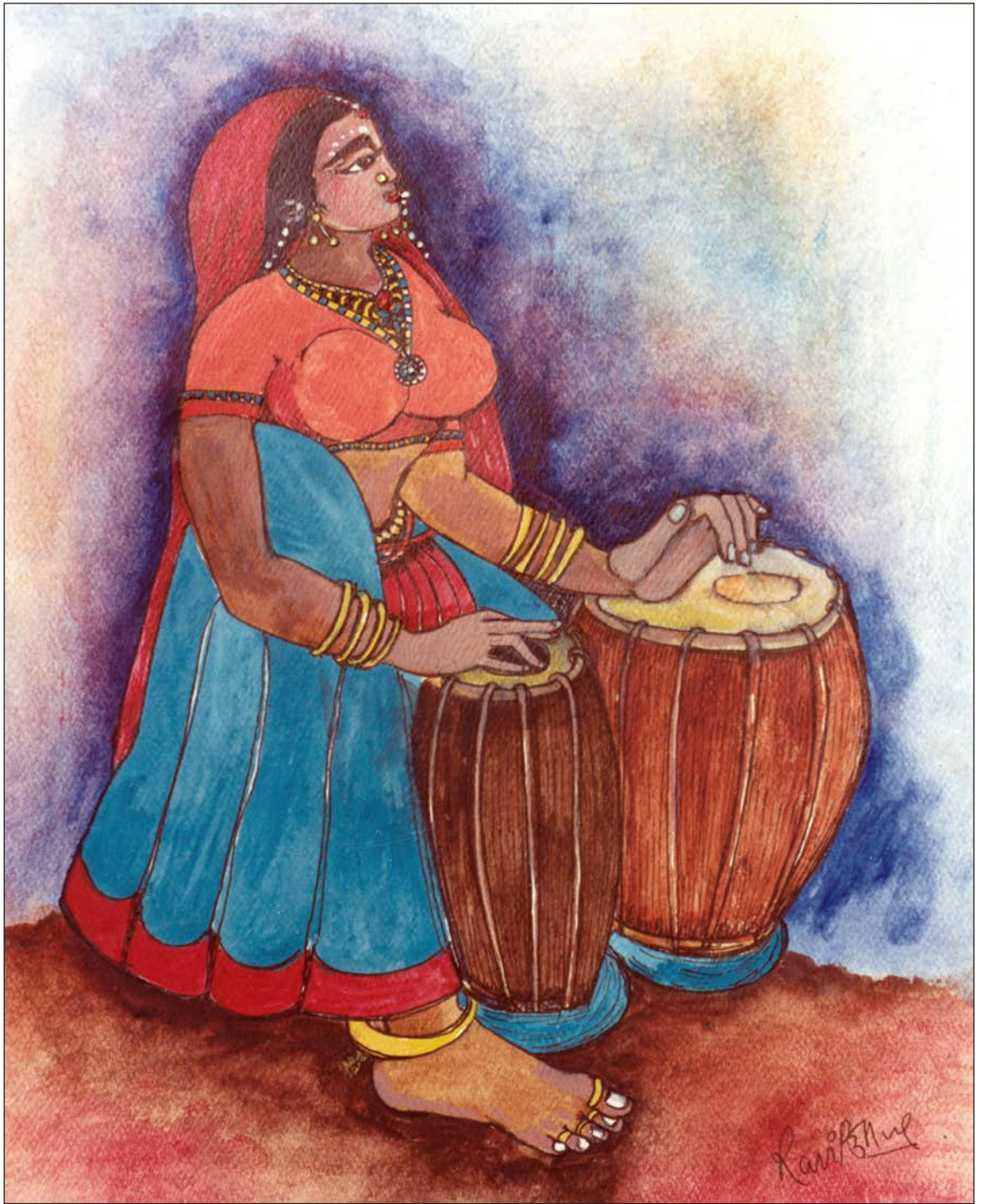
